INTRODUCTION

Canada's Multicultural Heritage The Ukrainian Canadians

Ukrainian Canadians, numbering over 600,000 in 1978, are the fifth largest ethnocultural group in the country after the French, British, Germans, and Italians. Ukrainians first came to Canada over 150 years ago although their continuous and mass immigration started in 1891.

This list is intended mainly to assist teachers as well as school, public and college librarians in the selection of titles to serve their courses, students and readers. In particular it should serve them in locating material for the new courses on Canada's multicultural heritage now authorized in Ontario and other provinces.

As pioneers of the Canadian West and builders of the railways, people from Ukraine played a significant role in the building of Canada. The fifth generation of Ukrainian Canadians is now entering our schools and it is partly to assist them in discovering their roots that this list is published.

The Ukrainian language is now offered in the elementary and high schools of Saskatchewan, Alberta, Manitoba, and in Ontario's high schools. Most leading Canadian universities also offer courses in the Ukrainian language. For this reason titles have been included to provide background information as well as language textbooks and literature.

Books in English, presently in print and available, are listed. However, a few important out of print titles have been included since they may be obtained through antiquarian booksellers or reprinted by the University Microfilms Xerox process as needed.

The prices are the latest listed in Canadian Books in Print 1977 (University of Toronto Press), Books in Print 1978-79 and Subject Guide to Books in Print 1978-1979 (Bowker, New York) or Ukrainian book store catalogues. However, with recent price changes they may vary from current levels. It should be mentioned that books unavailable from the publishers are often in stock in Ukrainian book stores. For this reason it is best to deal through a good local store of which a list may be found at the end.

Her book is a personal view focussing on Two Hills and reveals a lack of knowledge of Ukrainian Canadian history. This book, with its strong opinions and outspoken feminist and anti-establishment view, was a best seller in 1978.


